

Message from Rev. Bruce Nakamura

GRATITUDE IS THE SOURCE

Gratitude may not always be the outcome of happiness, but, Happiness is always the outcome of gratitude.

I do not regularly go to the movies nor have access to cable channels. Toward the close of 2012's holiday season, my wife and two of our grandchildren planned to visit just before the Christmas break. Due to their hectic schedule of first visiting my son's family in Honolulu, grandma Leslie knew she'd be burnt out by the time they got over to Kauai. So grandma insisted that I put in a basic cable for the two making the trip to see grandpa.

In a way we were all relieved since grandma could catch up on some rest here in Kauai (more or less). Now into the new year, I've not decided yet, if I'll keep the cable, let alone the television line connection as I have no regular favorites on television.

Once in a while I catch something on the REELS channel and one morning as I was preparing to go to west-side, I happen to glimpse part of a movie entitled "The Book of Eli".

The main character in this movie is Denzil Washington. He is a survivor in a post-apocalyptic time when most human beings have perished leaving few to fend for themselves.

While there's no mention of the direct cause of the world –wide apocalyptic disaster, there are pockets of humans surviving in the vast wasteland. One of them is a small community controlled by a man who is seeking something very rare and almost forgotten—the Holy Bible—the book in Eli's possession.

Eli refers to the book regularly for inspiration and guidance and applies it in his daily living. Before his partaking of food and drink, no matter how simple, he expresses his gratitude for their gifts, the dwelling and the company he might keep. Gratitude for Eli is the source of genuine sustenance and the Book inspires that source of gratitude –the Love of God-Jesus Christ.

This movie is not primarily about the Love of Christ, but, of its outcome— Gratitude as the source from which human beings endure with courage to discover hope and opportunities for another day. The town's leader however, covets Eli's Book because he's convinced that the Bible will gives him the power to control people's minds, hopes and lives.

Today, we live in a modern world in which the theme of religion, as with wealth, status and sheer raw power are devices used for selfinterests to gain power and control over others. Yet, these devices cannot and will not bring us genuine happiness and peace of mind.

In the Shin Buddhist tradition of Shinran Shonin, the Buddha-in-training, the Bodhisattava **Dharma-Treasury surveyed the Buddha-fields** and before his Buddha-Teacher World-Sovereign Buddha, vowed to bring all beings into his Pure Land—whether pure or defiled, male or female, young or old, promising to forsake not even one. Those who are given to the gift of True -Entrusting (Shinjin) of this Buddha of unlimited Light and Life will assuredly be born into His Country of Highest Bliss by saying His Name as Gratitude—Namo Amida Butsu. In turn, this limitless Light and Light return us in the Bodhisattva natural work into the world of impermanence and uncertainty by bringing others to the awakened state of Buddhahood and dynamic activity of liberating others.

As for myself, I cannot imagine the nature and content of such an incomprehensible spiritual undertaking on my behalf. I sometimes sense a wonder of how this could be a joy experience a basic gratitude at its source. It is a source that brings our life experiences into greater perspective—a peace-of-mind and joy we would not experience otherwise.

Lay Message

Turning the Soil

A few years ago I heard the phrase "turning the soil" referring to the changes that come in life. The phrase has stuck with me through the years, especially as I think about dealing with change and some of the uncomfortable feelings that we can have as we go through change. Of course, change is an on-going fact of life, so we deal with change daily and some of the uncomfortable feelings may come up often.

I didn't grow up in a farming family. father, however, taught me about the critical need to take care of the soil if we are to grow healthy plants and sustain our gardens. To maintain and sustain a healthy garden it is vital to not only turn the soil but to renew & revitalize the basic soil as well. If the soil isn't turned over and fresh nutrients added before planting the new seeds, we end up with a crop that is less than the previous one. Our gardens begin to shrink and be less productive. Even if we turn the soil but replant the same crops repeatedly the soil is depleted over time. We can't just keep planting broccoli over and over without change and expect perfect broccoli. We also know that when we turn the soil, we don't throw out the original soil and start from scratch but we do introduce new nutrients and new plants to the mix.

The concept of turning the soil applies to the earth and it applies to us right now as we face challenges in our temples. Our ideas are the plants in our gardens, our collective brainpower and our enthusiasm are where the nutrients come from. In life we know that if we only plant the

same ideas in the gardens of our hearts they will not grow in the way we envision. Without turning the soil and adding new ideas, using our brainpower and recharging our enthusiasm, we will be depleting our temple gardens. We will not be growing, but shrinking. As we turn the soil and work to sustain and renew our temples and our organization, we need to introduce fresh ideas, even those that may be outside the box or sound even slightly rebellious.

Turning the soil of our temple gardens doesn't mean throwing out the original soil to start from scratch but about introducing something new. For us it should be about allowing new ideas, fresh points of view without throwing out the old. If we are to have healthy temples to pass on to future generations we must tend to our gardens, Turn the soil regularly and replenish and revitalize both individually and collectively. We should strive to be open to new ideas and new perspectives if we are to not only sustain but renew the precious resource we hold in our hands and our hearts.

Thank you for this opportunity to share. Let us tend to our gardens and turn the soil with ideas and enthusiasm. Think outside the box and grow our gardens. We may even have some new plants, new colors and I think that we will find that it is as beautiful as ever.

Ask Rev. Bruce

Q: Shinran Shonin was also called Saint Shinran. How does one become a saint in Buddhism?

A: The term "saint" used in American Buddhism is historically derived from the Catholic tradition, The official church determined "sainthood" via a barrage of religiously verified events confirmed and sanctified by the Papacy.

The term "Shonin" in our own Pure Land tradition has at least two applications: 1) a Buddhist master studied under, e.g. Honen Shonin; 2) the inspirational founder of our Shin path, e.g. Shinran Shonin. Though "Shonin" sounds the same with Honen and Shinran, the first connotes spiritual teacher-mentor, while the second connotes our Founder, specifically Shinran Shonin.


