Amida Buddha's Eyes

A few months ago, I had a slight problem when I was in Honolulu for some occasion. I always wear contact lenses, because my eyesight is not good. However, when I had a dinner at some restaurant on that day, I started suffering from eye irritation because of dry eye. I used an eyedrop, but the problem was not solved. I had my eyeglasses, but I didn't carry it at that time. Therefore, I just gave up wearing the contact lenses. Then I spent an evening without them for a while. However, it was really inconvenient, because I couldn't see my surrounding, such as other people's face, street signs, etc. I went back to the hotel somehow, then I wore my glasses at last. I really felt relived at that time because I could see around.

After this incident, I remembered some teaching of Buddhism. Just like we have different eyesight, we see things differently. We encounter various events in our daily lives. If everything works out as we wish, it would be nice. However, lots of things don't go as we might have hoped. If we regard them as bad incidents, we would suffer from such things or complain about them. Buddhism teaches us that we tend to have such feelings, because of our self-centered viewpoint or *Gashu*. It is said that we often have a hard time to see things correctly. Once I heard an interesting thing that this viewpoint brings the following troublesome symptoms. If people have a self-centered viewpoint;

1. They think, "I am right. Others are wrong."

2. They hardly notice their own faults, but they see other's faults clearly.

- 3. They think that favorable people are good people, and unfavorable people are bad people.
- 4. They forget what they borrow, but they never forget what they lend.
- 5. They totally agree the above facts, but they hardly reflect on themselves.

Don't you think these symptoms are troublesome? This kind of viewpoint often causes us to suffer. However, fortunately, we have learned how to treat such self-centered viewpoint. We would live our lives relying on not our self-centered viewpoint but Amida Buddha's viewpoint.

Shinran Shonin said: When the waters -the minds, good and evil, of foolish beings- have entered the vast ocean of Amida's Vow of wisdom, they are immediately transformed into the mind of great compassion.

(Hymns of the Dharma-Ages: Collected Works of Shinran, p.408)

He illustrated that we tend to judge between good and bad, because of our self-centered mind. However, Amida Buddha has different viewpoint from ours. Just as various waters enter the ocean and immediately become seawater, so our self-centered minds would be transformed into the mind of great compassion by Amida Buddha's working.

When we have unfavorable events, we would complain about such things because of our selfcentered mind. If we cannot see a surrounding clearly, we would be able to wear glasses to see things correctly. If you are bothered by your self-centered mind, let us wear the glasses of Namo Amida Butsu together and live everyday with deep joy and gratitude. Namo Amida Butsu.

Father's Day-Leaving a Legacy Carol Valentine

Today is Father's Day. Personally, I think we should celebrate all influential males in our lives, whether it is our husband, father, father-in-law, grandfather, great-grandfather, uncle, brother or a teacher we may have had. We can honor those who have influenced us and thank them for helping us.

My biological father was influential in my life . . . he taught me how not to live my life. He wasn't mean, just unavailable. I have, as I have become older, come to realize that I am thankful to him because without him, I would not be here. He gave me life, along with the genes for curly hair, silver hair and high blood pressure. But most importantly, he did give me life. Growing up, however, the most influential male in my life was my step-father, a kind man who came into my life when I was 6. Along with my mother, he taught me how to treat other people and taught me how to be strong and stand up for myself without hurting others. That is the legacy he left for me, and for that I am forever grateful. Even though my step-father has been gone for 20 years, he is always in my heart, guiding me. He continues to guide our daughter, through what she learned from him and the way he lived his life. Our grandson will never know him, but he still experiences his legacy. The same is true for Wayne's father. Our grandson will never know him except for the memories and legacy shared through our daughter.

Let's face it; impermanence can be a little frightening. Impermanence means at some point, we will be forgotten. Life moves on and the world keeps turning whether we are here or not; or said in another way, "The carousel never stops turning." I think we will all be forgotten within 3-4 generations. My great-grandchildren will probably have no memories of me, outside of photos on the computer. That isn't something to be sad about; life moves on, we make memories and be the best we can be.

In Colorado, I used to be fascinated by old cemeteries that were around ghost towns and old mining towns. The tombstones were all from the 1800's. I used to wonder who those people were, where they came from, how they lived their lives and how they died. Whoever they were, the only part of them left was what they handed down to their families, whether it was something material or the memories, principles and integrity handed down. We are no exception. We will be gone but we will pass on our legacy.

Legacy sometimes it is the "stuff" that is passed on. Sometimes it is the memories and the words that are passed down. What do you think of when you hear the word "legacy?" For me, legacy speaks to the idea of impermanence, one of the cornerstone concepts of Buddhism, of the ever present change in our lives. Legacy is what is left behind when we pass on, whether it is a legacy at our job when we retire or the legacy we leave our families. What will your legacy be? Since we are not the Dalai Lama or Martin Luther King, our legacy will not go down in history, to be studied in school. Our legacy is our story. Our legacy is in Buddhism . . . how we treat other people, how we practice the basic concepts of Buddhism. Do we show gratitude not just for the big things but for all of the everyday things that happen? Do we show compassion for all beings or only those people we know? Do we actually practice the Golden Chain, thinking and saying good words and doing good deeds? Remember, practicing the Golden Chain is as simple as saying "hi", even if you saw someone 10 minutes ago, or holding a door open for someone else.

What will your legacy be? Will it be something others want to follow and emulate or will people look at your legacy and think "that's definitely <u>not</u> the way I want to live." We are in charge of our legacy, guided by our Buddhist concepts of kindness, compassion and gratitude. What will your legacy be? Choose well. Be kind and gentle to everyone you meet. Live the Dharma every day.

Please put your hands together in reverence for the words of the Buddha.

"When words are both true and kind, they can change the world."

Honzan recently announced that the Dento Hokoku Hoyo (伝灯奉告法要Commemoration Services of Transmission) of the 25th Sennyo Monshu will be held on the following dates (total of 80 services in 80 days in 10 periods);

2016

1st period: From Saturday, October 1 through Saturday, October 8 2nd period: From Thursday, October 20 through Thursday, October 27 3rd period: From Friday, November 4 through Friday, November 11 4th period: From Friday, November 18 through Friday, November 25 2017

5th period: From Tuesday, March 7 through Tuesday, March 14 6th period: From Tuesday, March 28 through Tuesday, April 4 7th period: From Tuesday, April 11 through Tuesday, April 18 8th period: From Tuesday, April 25 through Tuesday, May 2 9th period: From Tuesday, May 9 through Tuesday, May 16 10th period: From Wednesday, May 24 through Wednesday, May 31

The Commemoration Services will be held in the afternoon at Honzan (Kyoto, Japan) except one service on April 18, 2017 at Ohtani Honbyo. The office of the Bishop is planning to coordinate a pilgrimage tour for this special observance. Please wait for a more detailed information.
