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Fall Prevention

Recently, former President George H. W. Bush, age 91, fell at his summer home in Kennebunkport, Maine. According to news sources, he cracked the second vertebrae, but did not damage the nerve-endings. Thankfully, he will not need surgery but will need to be in a neck brace for some time. It can happen to anyone, at any time. The reality is that each year, one in every three adults ages 65 or older falls and 2 million are treated in emergency departments for fall-related injuries, and the risk of falling increases with each decade of life. The long-term consequences of fall injuries, such as hip fractures and traumatic brain injuries (TBI), can impact the health and independence of anyone, not just older adults. Thankfully many falls can be prevented. To help us all do our own part to prevent falls, read the following information.

Ideas from the Center from Disease Control (CDC) and Mayo Clinic regarding fall prevention. Remember, falls can happen at any age, even when we are young:

- Exercise regularly, particularly exercises which focus on leg strength & balance.
- Ask your doctor or pharmacist to review all medicines for side effects or interactions such as dizziness or drowsiness.
- Have your eyes checked by an eye doctor at least once a year and update your eyeglasses to maximize vision. Certain eye and ear disorders may increase the risk of falls.
- Wear sensible shoes. "Slippahs" may not be the best footwear.

Make your home safer by reducing tripping hazards. To make your home safer:

- Remove boxes, newspapers, electrical cords and phone cords from walkways.
- Move coffee tables, magazine racks and plant stands from high-traffic areas.
- Secure loose rugs with double-faced tape, tacks or a slip-resistant backing, or remove loose rugs from your home.
- Repair loose, wooden floorboards and carpeting right away.
- Immediately clean spilled liquids, grease or food.
- Use nonslip mats in your bathtub or shower.
- Add grab bars in bathroom areas for anyone having mobility challenges.
- Be sure to have railings on stairways and use good lighting in your home.
 Low lighting can be romantic but it can also make you miss the obstacles on the floor.

To lower the risk of fractures, be sure you do the following:

- Get adequate calcium and vitamin D—from food and/or from supplements.
- Do weight bearing exercises.
- Get screened and, if needed, treated for osteoporosis.

Going and Returning

Once someone asked me a question regarding one of Shinran Shonin's teachings as follows. "Sensei, I have one question. I learned we will be born in the Pure Land and become a Buddha after this life by entrusting our heart to Amida Buddha's working. However, I always hear, "The deceased reached the Pure Land" even at the funeral for those who had never come to the temple and listened to the teaching. I'm certain that they didn't entrust their heart to Amida Buddha. How can you tell they had also reached the Pure Land? I feel something contradictory."

We cannot avoid parting from those we love, such as family, friends, etc. We would understand this truth intellectually. However, it would be very hard for us to accept it when we encounter the separation. Then people would wonder where they had gone or what they are doing right now. The question someone asked me was also about our destination.

As he pointed out, Shinran Shonin said, "Entrusting ourselves to the inconceivable Buddhawisdom is taught to me the cause of birth in the fulfill land."

(Hymns of the Dharma-Ages: Collected Works of Shinran, p.410)

However, there are some people who had never had a chance to listen to the teaching. You may also wonder where they went. In Jodo Shin Buddhism, however, there is a teaching that enables us to realize that they also reached the Pure Land and became the Buddha. According to Shinran Shonin, Amida Buddha's working has two aspects: the aspect for our going forth to the Pure Land and the aspect for our return to this world to teach and guide all beings as Bodhisattva.

Once some minister talked about this teaching, and I was deeply impressed by it. "Some people lose a little baby who had never come to the temple and recited the Nembutsu. If we follow the teaching which requires efforts or conditions to go to a peaceful place, the deceased baby cannot be saved. However, if we think, "Because of the deceased baby, I started listening to the teaching, putting our hands together and reciting the Nembutsu," we would consider the baby as a Bodhisattva from the Pure Land. Jodo Shinshu provides us the teaching to enable us to consider and respect all deceased as Bodhisattva guiding us."

Shinran Shonin said: "Amida has fulfilled the directing of virtue, which has two aspects: that for our going forth and that for our return. Through these aspects of the Buddha's directing of virtue, we are brought to realize both mind and practice."

(Hymns of the Pure Land Masters: Collected Works of Shinran, p.370)

When we part from those we love, we would reflect on the meaning of this life and the impermanence of this world. Shinran Shonin considered some people as "accommodative virtue" (*gonke no nin*), which means incarnate body of a Buddha or a Bodhisattva to guide and save him.

This month, we will have the Obon observance which is held in memory of departed people. We would consider this opportunity as the important lesson to walk the right path, given by departed loved ones. Let us continue listening to the teaching of Nembutsu. Namo Amida Butsu.

Eshinni-Kakushinni Diane Kent

Good morning!

It is truly an honor for me, to be asked to share a Dharma message with you today, especially with the focus on Eshinni and Kakushinni. You probably all know that Eshinni was the wife of Shinran Shonin, our wise and compassionate founder, and Kakushinni was the youngest of their 6 children. I will chronicle a little bit about the life of these amazing women, and then I will tell you my perspective of how much these women remind me of each and every one of you, and how it makes me so proud to be a Pure Land Buddhist.

Eshinni was born into an aristocratic family in 1182 in Niigata Prefecture. Eshinni was the daughter of Miyoshi Tamenori, a Samurai of High Rank in Echigo. She inherited a good portion of the family's land, and was described as refined and well educated. Not much else is known about her in her early years. In my internet research, it seems that Shinran Shonin was banished to Echigo due to his abandoning of traditional monastic life at Mt. Hiei. He further broke his vows of celibacy when he met and married the nun, Eshinni in 1210, after being exiled there in Echigo for 3 years. Shortly after marrying, they moved to the Kanto Distctrict and lived there between 1212-1219.

20 years and 6 children later, Shinran Shonin decided to leave the Kanto region and move his family to Kyoto in 1233, to continue his work emphasizing that the Nembutsu teaching was for everyone, priest or lay, man or woman, without discrimination. Eshinni felt a very high regard for Shinran and his teachings. They lived in Kyoto together till 1254. Then it seemed that Eshinni's property in Echigo needed attention, so she returned 'home' to take care of business.

When she returned to Echigo, her farms were in poor harvest, and people were in severe hardship. There were many droughts and famine. Lives were meeting a severe fate. Eshinni was responsible for her farm, two orphaned grand children, servants and families. She left her 82 year old Husband in Kyoto with their daughter Kakushinni. The circumstances prevented her from returning to Kyoto ever again. However, while she was estranged from her husband and daughter, Eshinni wrote several letters to Kakushinni. They both realized that the autumn of their lives had passed and they were fast-approaching the 'winter' of their lives. She wrote of the harsh conditions and unfortunate sacrifices that were made. But despite that, she also wrote that there is no reason for her to be bitter, eluding to the fact that she was not alone. There were many others in the same or sometimes worse fate than she was. She carried on with the beilef that you simply must do our best with what we are blessed to have. Eshinni also wrote about Shinran Shonin's journey through life, as best as she could remember; including his early days at Mt. Hiei and his encounter with Master Honen. Those details reinforced an undersanding and deep appreciation of a daughter's love and devotion for her father.

Kakushinni was the one who took care of Shinran Shonin in the last decade of his life, especially when he was ill on his death bed. After his death, Kakushinni wanted to keep Shinran's teaching alive and perpetuated it for his followers. She built a mausoleum on his gravesite enshrining an image of Shinran. As a result, the Nembutsu teaching began to reach more people. In 1277, Kakushinni donated this mausoleum to the Shin Buddhist following and it became an official temple known as the Otani Memorial (Otani Byodo). She established the system of caretakers (*rusu*) composed of her descendants, who had to look over the gravesite. This *rusu* system later developed into what is known today as Monshu or patriarchal leadership of our branch school, and the Otani mausoleum became the Hongwanji temple.

DONATION FROM JODO SHINSHU HONGWANJI-HA

Honpa Hongwanji Mission of Hawaii recently received a funding assistance of \$400,000 from the Jodo Shinshu Hongwanji-ha for the undertaking of the Pacific Buddhist Academy's new school building. Jodo Shinshu Hongwanji-ha recently launched the Comprehensive Advancement Project which will be executed for 10 accounting years from June 1, 2015 through March 31, 2025 to enrich and promote our organization on the occasions of the Commemoration Services of Transmission of Jodo Shinshu tradition in 2016-2017, the 850th Anniversary of the birth of Shinran Shonin, and the 800th Anniversary of the establishment of Jodo Shinshu in 2023. One major focus of the Advancement Project is "contributing to the general welfare of society based on the spirit of Buddhism" and, as part of this effort in the Overseas Districts or internationally, this funding assistance of \$400,000 to PBA for the year 2015 was disbursed recently.

Eshinni's letters weren't discovered until 1921. But it was those letters that truly brought to life, the concept of women playing an equally important role in life as our men. And those letters gave credence to Shinnran Shonin's teachings, and everything that Pure Land Buddhism wishes to share with the world.

Nembutsu guides the life of real, living people, with daily cares such as wondering about the children and grandchildren (and great-grandchildren), providing for the family with food & shelter, mending clothes, caring for elderly parents, and sometimes you're trying to do all these things while you're living apart from those people that you love, just like Eshinni. It's not always easy, but what gets us through those occasional rough spots, is thoughtful reflection. It's about being grateful for those who came before you, and appreciating the sacrifices they made in order to provide an opportunity for a better tomorrow. It's about kindness and sharing – pure & beautiful thoughts, pure & beautiful words, and pure & beautiful deeds.

Eshinni and Kakushinni were intelligent women who portrayed devotion, responsibility, kindness, a sense of purpose, and all of this with a very giving spirit. I know that all of these qualities exist in the women sitting in temple today. And the wonderful by-product of that is that these qualities are very infectious. So all of you men, who hang around these women, all have those same wonderful qualities. That's what I love about my Hongwanji family!

In closing, let me just say one more thing. Do what you can for each other, because every little bit, is a little bit more. Thank you, and have a wonderful day! Namo Amida Butsu.
