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Gratitude is Good for You

As we finish this bon season, we are reminded of gratitude—gratitude for our lives, for the lives that came before us and for all those who help us that we may not even know. Gratitude is not only an essential part of Buddhism, but it has actually been proven to be good for us in many ways. Science has found that grateful people are happier, less depressed, less stressed, and more satisfied with their lives and social relationships. Grateful people also have higher levels of control of their environments, personal growth, purpose in life, and self-acceptance. Grateful people have more positive ways of coping with the difficulties they experience in life, being more likely to seek support from other people, reinterpret and grow from the experience, and spend more time planning how to deal with the problem.

Gratitude helps us to

- redirect our focus from what is troubling or worrying us to what lifts our spirit, to help us to shift from negative to positive thinking and energy.
- have a true perspective of what's at stake (including "how important is it?").
- reduce our anxiety, thereby reducing our fears.
- let go of the need to control all in our lives, to create space for greater calmness and serenity in life.



How do we practice gratitude? We know what gratitude is but often in our busy and hectic lives, we forget to practice gratitude. Just five minutes daily is all it takes to rewire your brain. By practicing gratitude, the awareness of the positive things in life, we fight off the brain's natural tendency to scan for and spot the negatives. As a result, we train our brains to be more positive and thus happier. Here are a few thoughts to help us learn to practice gratitude daily.

- Make a Gratitude Jar or create a Gratitude Journal and put one thing you are grateful for in it every night before you go to sleep.
- Every morning, as you wake up, be thankful that you have another day to enjoy, regardless of the weather or your aches and pains.
- Thank the people behind the service you receive. Say "Thank you" to those whose work benefits you, whether it is a store clerk, the wait staff at a restaurant or the bank teller.
- Give a sincere compliment to someone you know or even to someone you don't know.

Think about what Buddhist writer Jack Kornfield has written, "Don't take life so seriously, or get so wrapped up in your own everyday dramas that you forget to see the beauty that is constantly surrounding you."

Always be grateful for your life.

Invisible Working

Recently I bought a book through the Internet. Do you use this kind of service? Since it's really convenient, I sometimes do Internet shopping. I can easily look for books or other things at stores on the Internet. I can even order books from Japan. The book I bought was delivered only five days after I ordered it. This kind of service is very convenient. After I order something, I can track where the item is, on its way to me. The book I bought was sent from Dallas, Texas to Memphis, Tennessee, then to Honolulu. Finally it was delivered from Honolulu to Lihue.

Looking at tracking information, I was surprised that the book was sent from a remote city where I have never been. When I received the book, I thought "Oh, this book made a long trip and arrived by the help of many people." I just ordered the book on my computer and received it. It was a very simple process. However, thanks to the tracking service, I realized many people helped to deliver the book.

Actually, not only do we receive things from shopping on the Internet, but also all things we have and use are brought through various processes that we cannot see. For example, we can buy fruit at the supermarket. However, they don't start out in the supermarket. There are many people who grow them, many people who process them and many people who transport them to the supermarket. In addition, fruit needs sunshine, rain, and good rich soil to grow in. Thanks to such conditions and processes, we can buy fruits at the supermarket. If we could use a tracking service for those items, I think we would discover an amazing process.

We always recite the Nembutsu. In our Jodo Shinshu teachings, we learn it's not we who recite the Nembutsu by our self power, but Amida Buddha's working that enables us to recite the Nembutsu. I think various causes and conditions enabled us to utter the name of Amida Buddha. All these have happened because of Amida Buddha's great vow to save us. If we could use the tracking service to see how the Nembutsu is delivered to us, we would be amazed by the invisible process and have deep gratitude indeed.

Shinran Shonin expressed his deep gratitude thinking about the origin of Amida Buddha's working in the following passage. When you read this passage, please try to put yourself in Shinran Shonin's place, so that we can see that Amida's vow was made for each of us. He said: **"When I ponder on the compassionate Vow of Amida, established through five kalpas of profound thought, it was for myself, Shinran, alone. Because I am a being burdened so heavily with karma, I feel even more deeply grateful to the Primal Vow which is made to decisively save me."** (Tannisho:Taitetsu Unno, Tannisho, p.4)

We receive many different things in our daily lives. It's difficult to find out the causes and conditions by which we receive those things, but we would have greater appreciation if we try to imagine. The tracking service of the Internet Shopping made me think about such invisible processes. It also made me remember Amida Buddha's immeasurable working. Let us live our daily lives, reciting the Nembutsu. Namo Amida Butsu.

ALOHA FOR NEPAL – UPDATE

The Honpa Hongwanji Mission of Hawaii created the "Aloha for Nepal Fund" in response to the massive 7.8 magnitude earthquake that devastated the country of Nepal on April 25, 2015. This disaster left thousands dead and injured countless more. The people of Nepal have begun to rebuild over the months since the earthquake with the help of relief organizations.

Hawaii Kyodan responded immediately by donating an initial \$10,000 to Kathmandu Hongwanji and \$5,000 to the disaster relief organization, Mercy Corps.

The "Aloha for Nepal" campaign was a tremendous success. The outpouring of aloha from our friends and supporters, allowed us to raise a total of \$38,552.92! Of this amount, we were able to distribute a total of \$38,471.64 which was the net after online processing fees. Kathmandu Hongwanji and Mercy Corps received additional funds to support the work they are doing to rebuild Nepal.

Mercy Corps: \$25,716.64 + \$5,000 = \$30,716.64
Kathmandu Hongwanji: \$12,755.00 + \$10,000 = \$22,755.00

October 18: United BWA Conference will be held at Kapa'a Hongwanji. Registration for the conference will be at 9:00 am, with opening service at 9:30 am.

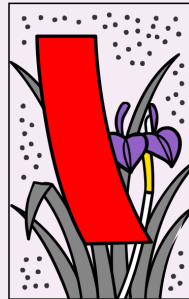

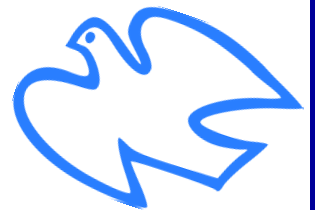

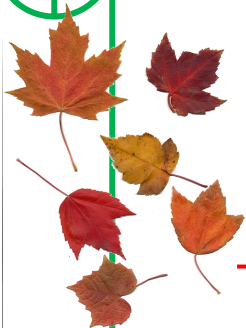
