Embrace Change: Awareness (Seek Opportunities)

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The Lotus Flower

The lotus is one of the most well -known symbols of Buddhism. In the center of our temple there is a statue of Amida Buddha on the altar. This statue is standing on the

lotus flower. The lotus grows in the mud, but it blossoms purely and beautifully above the muddy water surface.

The environment of the muddy water allows the flower to rise and bloom above the murk. The mud nourishing the roots represents our messy human lives. It is through our human experiences and our suffering that we seek to break free and bloom. But while the flower rises above the mud, the roots and stem remain in the mud, where we live our lives. As one Buddhist saying puts it, "May we exist in muddy water with purity, like a lotus."

In Buddhist art, a fully blooming lotus flower signifies enlightenment and self-awareness, while a closed bud represents a time before enlightenment.

The lotus flower represents rebirth in a figurative sense. The rebirth can be a change of ideas, an acceptance of Buddha where there once was none, the dawn after one's darkest day, a renaissance of beliefs or the ability to see past wrongs.

Guidance from Departed Loved Ones

Obon season is fast approaching now. I'm sure that many people are looking forward to this Bon Dance season. Lihue Hongwanji will be holding its Bon Dance on August 7 and 8.

During this season, we will hold not only the Bon Dance but also different services relating to Obon, like Bon Service, Hatsu Bon Service, Graveside Services and Columbarium Services. We observe these services through remembering departed loved ones. In our life, we cannot avoid parting from those we love. When we encounter a separation, we would have different emotions. Needless to say, this is a sorrowful event. However, the teaching of Buddhism gives us the guiding principle for such a situation. When I think about it, I always remember the story that would give us some lessons.

This episode is about Izumi Shikibu who was a famous Japanese poetess of the Heian Period. She lived in Japan about 1,100 years ago. When she was living she had a sad experience. She had a daughter, but when her daughter was a child, she suddenly passed away. Izumi Shikibu suffered great sorrow, then she wrote a poem to express her feeling. "My child passed away. I want to trace her final journey to the other world. I don't know where she is now, but I wish she would come back to my home."

Her poem shows that she deeply grieved for her daughter and had difficulty in accepting the reality. Even after her death, she was worried what her daughter was doing. We would have a similar feeling when we encounter a parting from immediate family or friends.

After some time, she made another poem about her daughter. However, her expression in the second poem was different from the first one. It is said that her feeling changed after she started listening to the teaching of Buddhism. Her second poem is: "My life is transient in this dreamlike world. I must be aware of this reality. This important guidance was given by my daughter."

In the first poem, Izumi Shikibu just lamented her daughter's death. On the contrary, in the second poem, she regarded her daughter as her teacher. There is a big difference between the two poems. She thought that her daughter gave the important guidance to her and tried to teach the truth of this world.

This is the story that I heard before. As the story shows, we have a sad feeling when we experience separation. However, we would be able to understand the parting differently through listening to the teaching of Buddhism.

Shinran Shonin said: "Those who reach the Pure Land of happiness return to this world of the five defilements, where, like the Buddha Sakyamuni, they benefit sentient beings without limit."

(Hymns of the Pure Land: Collected Works of Shinran, p. 329)

He teaches us that, when our life is over in this world, we will be born into the Pure Land and become a Buddha through Amida Buddha's working. In addition, those who become a Buddha will return to this world to save others as Bodhisattva. Through listening to this teaching, we would be aware that departed loved ones are guiding us right now as Izumi Shikibu felt.

When we part from those we love, we would reflect on the meaning of this life and the impermanence of this world. We will have the Obon observance which is held in memory of departed people. We would consider this opportunity as the important lesson to walk the right path and to live each day to the fullest, given by departed loved ones. Let us continue listening to the teaching of Nembutsu. Namo Amida Butsu.

Golden Chain & Happiness

I heard the other day that money can't buy happiness but generosity can.

The flip side of the same coin is "gratitude." When we can truly be grateful for those little things we have, we can have greater happiness and peace. Now, generosity & gratitude go beyond generosity with and gratitude for our money. Generosity includes being generous with our thoughts, our words and our deeds and being grateful for what we have. Hey, wait a minute that sounds like the Golden Chain. We repeat the Golden Chain every week but do we really pay attention to the words? The beauty of repetition is that we don't have to think about the words, they are just in our brains without thinking. We can just say the words. However, the downside of repetition is that we don't have to think about the words. We say the words but what are we really saying? What is the meaning of "The Golden Chain?" The Golden Chain contains the concepts of Buddhism . . . according to Rev. Harry Bridge from Oakland Buddhist Temple, the Golden Chain is a way of saying "Thank you." It tells us to live our lives the best way we can; not perfectly, just the best we can. The Golden Chain talks of Interdependence (I am a link . . . I must keep my link bright and strong). It talks of generosity (I will be kind and gentle to every living thing and protect all who are weaker than myself). It talks of the 8-Fold path (right thoughts, right speech and right actions). As we say the words of the Golden Chain, we need to think about the words and their meanings in our lives, to give us guidance to live in the dharma.

I heard an interesting concept the other day, about going on a diet . . . a thought diet. The idea of going on a thought diet is that we have so many negative thoughts on a daily basis that we really have to train ourselves to notice the negative and change to the positive. It isn't easy. Going on any diet isn't easy but going on a thought diet is even more difficult. Since the Golden Chain says we need to think pure and beautiful thoughts that's the diet goal we need to set. Let me give you an example of a thought diet. There is a video I found on YouTube that shows a bon dance segment from a temple in California. Most of the people seem to know the dance relatively well, with the exception of one man who is there with his children. At first glance, I am embarrassed to admit that I thought, "He's not very good at dancing, He's really not even paying attention to the music or the moves is he? What a goof." I recognized that I was being judgmental and only thinking negative thoughts. Then I thought, "What would I do if I was on a Thought Diet?" That meant that I had to change my negative thoughts to positive ones. What I came up with was "He brought his children to the bon dance celebration and he is out in the ring dancing with them. He is spending time with his children and doing something with them. What a great thing!"

Now I have a challenge for everyone. Let's all go on a thought diet. Every time you catch yourself thinking negative thoughts about someone or something, see if you can think of something positive instead. It can be difficult but it really is good for your health. Science has shown us, negative thoughts harm our immune system and happiness is good for our health. Choose joy over negativity. It will help you live a longer and happier life.

Remember, there is always, always something to be thankful for. We just have to be willing to let those thoughts in.

In closing, let me read this quote about happiness:

"No one can control your happiness The question in life is not how much time we have but what we can do with it. This is your story, and it is beautiful.

So live and realize, upon reflection, that real happiness is not complicated at all."

The Honpa Hongwanji Mission of Hawaii Committee on Social Concerns has decided to make an emergency contribution for immediate aid and also embark on a special Nepal disaster relief drive called "Aloha for Nepal." 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Pacific Buddhist Academy

Capital Campaign

Pacific Buddhist Academy's goal is to complete construction before December 2016.

Construction Costs: PBA's Capital Campaign budget is \$8 million for building construction and other costs.

Fundraising Plan: PBA's goal is to complete fundraising by December 2015, and start construction as soon as fundraising is completed.

Total Amount Left to Raise: \$2.3 million

PBA cannot start construction until they get donations and pledges totaling the full construction cost because of a clause in the lease agreement with Hawaii Betsuin, the landlord. PBA received a \$1.5 million grant from the Weinberg Foundation, but it has a clause that requires completion of the construction within a certain time limit. If construction isn't started by the end of the year, the grant may be in jeopardy.


