Embrace Change: New Vision (Create Engagement)

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The Legislative Assembly On February 12 and 13, Reverend Takahashi and three lay delegates from Lihue Hongwanji Mission will attend the Legislative Assembly, also known as Giseikai, at the



Honpa Hongwanji Mission of Hawaii (HHMH). Each minister is a delegate and each temple is entitled to at least one delegate. The number of additional delegates per temple is set by district and influenced by membership count. Any number of observers are welcome to participate. This year, your lay representatives are Lynne Matsumura, Gail Shibuya, and Carol Valentine, who were selected by the LHM Board of Directors.

The Legislative Assembly is the annual meeting where the Budget of the HHMH is passed and resolutions are considered that determine the policies and programs of the organization. The debate is sometimes rigorous when controversial issues arise. It is an opportunity to hear and give input, keeping the welfare of individual temples, districts, and the entire organization in mind. The final outcome, whether it benefits our temple or not, is accepted and supported.

There are many ways to be involved in the Hongwanji organization. Carol Valentine serves the Kauai district as a member of the HHMH Board of Directors. Wayne Fujioka is an Advisor to the Board. Rev. Kazunori Takahashi begins a two-year term as President of the Kauai Hongwanji Council and Lynne Matsumura is its Treasurer. Several LHM members serve on HHMH Committees – Gladys Fujiuchi-Music; Lynette Mizuo-Social Concerns; Morton Yamasaki-Membership & Proration and Strategic Plan; Lynne Matsumura-Central Planning & Research and Personnel; Carol Valentine – Buddhist Education; Wayne Fujioka – Finance, Board of Inquiry, and Implementation Maintenance; Sets Ushio-Strategic Plan.

#### Now or Never

Once I read an interesting article that reminded me of an important thing about Buddhism. The article was about the New Year's Resolution. According to the article, in United States, many people make a New Year's resolution for the New Year, to change some habits. For example, some people want to exercise more, lose weight, stop smoking or drinking, save money and so on. However, the article also said that a third of our resolutions are discarded by the end of January. Four out of five people simply give their resolutions up. In addition, some people make same resolutions every year, because they always give up a few months after the New Year.

One of the biggest reasons why they give up the resolution is that they tend to postpone their good intentions. They think, "Oh, I'm busy this week, so I will start next week." or "I can start next month." Then the year is up before they accomplish their goal.

This article reminded me of the proper attitude for listening to the teaching of Buddhism. Rennyo Shonin said, "In the Buddhist teachings, there can be no thought of tomorrow. Hurry up! Hurry up! when it comes to the Buddha Dharma." He also said, "Hear the Buddha-Dharma well when young. When you grow old, you will find walking difficult and also get sleepy when hearing the Dharma. Therefore, hear the Buddha Dharma well when young."

He kept telling people that we must listen to the teaching now and it shouldn't be postponed. Some people think that Buddhism is for the future or the time after this life. However that is a misunderstanding. Buddhism teaches us how to live in the present moment.

Regarding this guidance, I would like to share one story that I once heard. This is the episode of a Japanese person who sincerely followed the Nembutsu teaching. He passed away at the age of 68 because of illness. A couple of months before he passed away, he had a chance to get together with his family and relatives. At that time, he spoke as follows. "Thank you for coming today. I'm so happy to see you. As you know, I have a terminal illness. I think I will die soon. I'm not sure how my life ends. I may be suffering. I may not be able to speak. However, please don't worry about me because Amida Buddha always embraces me. I will be born into the Pure Land and become a Buddha. There is nothing to worry about. I will be waiting to see you in the Pure Land. I'm glad to have a chance to express my appreciation today."

When I heard this episode, I was really impressed. He had a sickness. He realized he will die soon. However, even in such a situation, he lived his life with full of gratitude. He truly accepted the reality of this world and entrusted his life to Amida Buddha's working. If he didn't listen to the teaching of Nembutsu, he wouldn't have had this kind of peaceful mind. Rennyo Shonin said, "Hurry up, hurry up", because it brings us the firm strength to our transient life. Shinran Shonin said: **Of those who encounter the power of the Primal Vow, not one passes by in vain, they are filled with the treasure of ocean of virtues; The defiled waters of their blind passions not separated from it.** 

("Hymns of the Pure Land, Collected Works of Shinran, p.364")

We would have the habit of postponing important things somehow. However, if we keep postponing, we never put them into action. The article about New Year's resolution made me remember the important thing. Fortunately we have already encountered the teaching of Nembutsu. Let us keep remembering the words of our masters, listen to the teaching of Nembutsu and live each day to the fullest.

## **Chinese Zodiac - Year of the Monkey**

In Hawaii we are surrounded by so many diverse cultures. We try to draw upon and learn from all cultures as we go through our lives. Buddhism has taught us to be open minded about other people and other philosophies. This article is an example of the range of diversity in Hawaii.

According to the Chinese zodiac, 2016 will be the Year of the Monkey and will begin on Feb. 8, 2016 and last to January 27, 2017. For reference, other Chinese Zodiac Years of the Monkey are 1920, 1932, 1944, 1956, 1968, 1980, 1992, 2004, 2016, 2028. During a much earlier period in China, the dignified Chinese official title of nobleman was pronounced 'Hou', which is the same as the pronunciation of "monkey" in Chinese. The animal was thereby bestowed with an auspicious meaning. So if you were born in the Year of the Monkey, be happy with this auspicious animal.

### Personality of people born in the Year of the Monkey

The people born in the Year of the Monkey are cheerful and energetic by nature and usually represent flexibility. People born under the sign of the Monkey are also wise, intelligent, confident, charismatic, loyal, inventive, and skillful and make good leaders. People born under the sign of the Monkey also like a challenge and therefore should seek out exciting, speculative and challenging jobs. In their families, they are usually considerate and thoughtful.

# Three Wise Monkeys 😰 😰

While we are still thinking about monkeys, there is a story about the Three Wise Monkeys we are probably all aware of - the story of the monkeys who "Hear no evil, See no evil and Speak no evil." There are many versions of the Three Wise Monkeys, from brass & wooden statues to cartoon characters to emojis in text messages. In Japan, there is a carved wooden version of the Three Wise Monkeys in a Shinto shrine at Nikko. Even Mahatma Gandhi had a small statue of the three monkeys.

In our modern times there has been a new addition to the Three Wise Monkeys. In addition to "See no evil, Hear no evil, Speak no evil", the thought of "Post no evil" has been added as a reminder to be kind and gentle in the words we use online.

Just as there are many versions of the Three Wise Monkeys, there are differing

explanations of the meaning of "See no evil, Hear no evil, Speak no evil, Post no evil." It does not mean to hide from the world but to recognize what is happening in the world. In our Buddhist tradition, the words of the proverb reflect the idea of not dwelling on evil thoughts or words, which relates to Right Thoughts, Right Speech and Right Actions.

It is also a festive occasion welcoming everyone to celebrate the inauguration of the new Monshu.

#### **12 Million Pounds of Food Distributed**

Did you know that 1 out of 5 people, annually, need help in getting food? Yes, according to the Fact Book of the Hawaii Food Bank 287,000 people, of all ages, receive help in getting food each year in Hawaii. Recently, on December 28, 2015, Rev. Blayne Higa, Chair of the Honpa Hongwanji Mission of Hawaii Committee on Social Concerns and Bishop Eric Matsumoto, Bishop of the Jodo Shin Buddhist Mission, visited Polly Kauahi, Vice President and Chief

The Committee also made donations to Neighbor Island agencies such as Maui Food Bank, The Food Basket (Hawaii Island) and Kauai Independent Food Bank & Hawaii Food Bank Kauai Branch as part of a State-wide effort to eliminate hunger. In total, \$6,000.00 was donated for the year, 2015. According to Hawaii Food Bank, a \$10 donation distributes food for 25 meals. This contribution is in addition to other efforts, directly or indirectly, connected with the Honpa Hongwanji Mission of Hawaii such as the Oahu United Jr. YBA and Hawaii Buddhist Council Food Drives. The HHMH would like to express their gratitude to the Members and Friends of Honpa Hongwanji Mission of Hawaii for your generosity which allows the Mission to help those in need in our communities. It is anticipated that with the impact of the related concern of Homelessness/Houselessness across our State the need for food will also increase in the coming years.
