Embrace Change: Harmony (Accept Differences)

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COMMITTEE ON SOCIAL CONCERNS



“Omimai”, as you may already know, is a Japanese custom that is often used to inquire and call or visit someone who is ill or who has had an accident. The Committee on Social Concerns (CSC) uses the term “Omimai” to reach out and respectfully express our concern to a member (or a temple) who has experienced some type of unexpected hardship, particularly in the case of property damage from a disaster.

At the May 5th HHMH Board of Directors meeting, the following Emergency Disaster related actions were approved, coordinated with the Office of the Bishop, on behalf of the recent rain-related disaster on Kauai. A donation of \$4,000 is being sent to Kauai Hongwanji Council (KHC) with KHC to determine and distribute funds to organization(s) and/or individual(s) working towards rain and flood disaster relief efforts on Kauai, in addition to donations to individuals who personally experienced rain-related damage to their home/property. In addition to the donations for Kauai, a donation of \$1,100 was also given to the Hawaii State VOAD (Volunteer Organizations Active in Disaster) because of their disaster-related help. Honpa Hongwanji Mission of Hawaii is an official member of the Hawaii VOAD. The Hawaii VOAD consists of non-profit organizations, faith-based groups, and partner government agencies. Along with the Kauai rain/flooding disaster help, Honpa Hongwanji Mission of Hawaii is continuing to assess the on-going volcanic/lava disaster impacts to our members (and temples) on the Big Island. Because of the unpredictable nature and the potential damages that an active volcano may cause, this assessment will take some time as conditions continue to change over time.

Currently, the CSC is not planning to set-up a special collection for the Kauai and Big Island disasters but will rely on currently available funds from the Social Welfare Fund which is replenished through donations from annual Social Concerns fund drives. The Committee on Social Concerns is grateful for the generous donations from Honpa Hongwanji members and the CSC will continue to monitor the fund balance to ensure that a minimum level remains available in the fund, especially considering the 2018 hurricane season beginning soon.

Bodhisattvas

The Buddha said to Ananda, “Bodhisattvas in that land, supported by the Buddha's majestic powers, in as short as it takes to eat one meal, go to countless worlds in the ten quarters in order to pay homage and make offerings to the Buddhas, the World-honored Ones. In accordance with their thoughts, innumerable and countless offerings including flowers, incense, music, silken canopies, and banners, spontaneously appear just as they wish. They are rare, exquisite, excellent, and unlike those of this world. They are always offered to the great assembly of Buddhas, bodhisattvas, and sravakas. ... The bodhisattvas rejoice together, play celestial music in the air, and sing songs with wondrous voices praising the virtues of the Buddhas. They hear and accept the teaching with great joy.” (The Sutra on the Buddha of Immeasurable Life: *The Three Pure Land Sutras*, p. 61)

This passage is from *the Sutra of the Buddha of Immeasurable Life or the Larger Sutra*. Sakyamuni Buddha talked to Ananda who is one of his disciples about the Bodhisattvas who pay homage and make offerings to the Buddhas. I cannot help but read this passage again and again now.

It was recently announced that as of July 1, I will be transferred from Lihue Hongwanji to the Honpa Hongwanji Mission of Hawaii Headquarters as the Executive Assistant to the Bishop. I was assigned to Lihue Hongwanji in September, 2014. Since then three years and ten months have passed like a flash. As I write my last article for the Dharma Wheel, I would like to express my deepest gratitude to all of you. I have been able to perform my responsibilities until today because of your kind help, warm support, encouragement and generous advice.

Through my ministry at Lihue Hongwanji, I have had a lot of opportunities to share the Nembutsu teachings with you. I delivered my messages at Sunday services, funeral services, memorial services, various activities, etc. I had conversations and discussions about Buddhism with you occasionally. At the same time, reflecting on the period I stayed here, I feel you have enabled me to deepen the joy of listening and sharing the teaching of Nembutsu.

When you hear Buddhist temple or sangha, what comes to your mind? I guess there are many different ideas. Speaking of Lihue Hongwanji, I think of each one of you, the Nembutsu teaching, the beautiful altar, the temple buildings and grounds which contain a long history and thoughts of the past ministers and a number of members who have transmitted the Nembutsu teaching and supported Lihue Hongwanji.

In addition, if we think about temple from Buddha's enlightened viewpoint, we can see another view. According to the passage of the Larger Sutra, Bodhisattvas in the Pure Land go to countless worlds in order to pay homage and to make offerings to the Buddhas. If that is the case, where can we see them? After reading this passage again and again, I feel that I could see Bodhisattvas at Lihue Hongwanji over the past three years and ten months.

According to Shinran Shonin, Amida Buddha's working has two aspects: the aspect for our going forth to the Pure Land and the aspect for our return to this world to teach and guide all beings as Bodhisattvas. In this life, we cannot become a Buddha or a Bodhisattva because we are ordinary human beings possessed of blind passions. However, through listening to the Jodo Shinshu teaching, I can consider everyone I have met as Bodhisattvas. There are kind Bodhisattvas, strict Bodhisattvas, and Bodhisattvas who give me a helping hand. Such Bodhisattvas kindly appeared before me as I walked the path of life to Buddhahood under Amida Buddha's wisdom and compassion.

While we know that members may want to make donations with good intentions to help, the following advice should be heeded before any donations are made. (This information comes from Mr. Ken Okimoto, the Big Island representative to the CSC) "Before you donate, pay attention to what kinds of donations are requested; be sure who or what responsible group is willing and able to handle your donation; don't just donate whatever to whomever." Monetary donations are usually quicker, easier to coordinate, and allows maximum flexibility for the recipient to meet unmet needs. Remember, too, it is the donor's responsibility to research an organization or a fund to be sure it is valid and will be used for disaster relief efforts in the designated area before a donation is made.


