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A Message from the Bishop's Corner of the Honpa Hongwanji Mission of Hawaii Headquarters Update

Today, as I address you, as part of our effort to upgrade the Headquarters Update with this "Bishop's Corner," I would like to express my deep sadness and deepest condolences to those

who were killed at the two New Zealand mosques and their families and friends including the local Muslim community here in Hawaii. The intensity and frequency of these terror attacks filled with hate is alarming to say the least and we should all be concerned. It can happen, anywhere and anyplace. While we should not let panic and fear rule our lives, it would be prudent to be prepared and have a plan of what to do in the event that something similar should happen locally.

As I reflect, a thought came to mind that possibly the greatest protection against such an attack occurring, in one way, may be our own individual awareness of ourselves. We are all human. We have ideals which we embrace and try live up to, but at the same time we are fragile and can be volatile. Our own worst enemy may not be someone else, but could be our own self. At Chinese and Japanese Buddhist Temples, many times, one will find a lion(s) depicted among peonies. The symbolism is that our worst enemy is not an external physical enemy of another, but rather the internal enemies of arrogance, self-centeredness, ignorance and hate to name a few which plague us. Just as the mighty lion has few external enemies, but a little parasite inside the lion's stomach can make the King of Beasts ill and can be cured only by the medicinal properties of the peonies. I remember a quote by Rev. Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr., who said, "Man is not our Enemy" "intolerance, fanaticism, dictatorship, cupidity, hatred and discrimination" are the real enemies" "which are present…in our very hearts and minds." If each and every person could come to this kind of realization it might contribute to a more peaceful and harmonious world through our humility.

For we, of the Honpa Hongwanji Mission of Hawaii, let us focus on our Theme and Slogan "Embrace Change: Transformation (Walk in Peace)." May our temples resound with earnest Dharma discussion about what happens when we encounter Amida Buddha's Wisdom and Compassion. I have been emphasizing "Responding in gratitude to Amida Buddha's Great Wisdom and Compassion" from 8 years ago. I have stated that all positive thoughts and actions arise from shinjin and/or our being nurtured by

the Buddha's 12 Lights especially the Lights of Wisdom, Purity and Joy which address our ignorance, our greed and our anger/hatred like the peonies which save the lion. The

inspiration and motivation comes from the Buddha and our (responsive) actions are guided by the Dharma or Teachings. Again, I ask, please embrace Gomonshu's "A Way of Living as a Nembutsu Follower" as a guide and the compilation which I have shared, many times, "Passages on (nurturing) the Sangha as reference for Dharma Messages and aspirations for meetings and gatherings, so that Nembutsu-sha/people of Nembutsu who reflect the Dharma are nurtured and contribute towards world peace and harmony through awareness and humility. As we, the Sangha, are nurtured and try to live the Dharma our temples can become, even more, places of refuge where people can experience less of the trauma and drama of samsara.

In our 130th year in Hawaii, let us embrace our Theme of "Embrace Change." In celebration of our 130th Anniversary, please remember my request that you observe our 130th Anniversary at the temple level so that more people will be able to celebrate our Anniversary (and not only those who can travel afar). Aside from the 130th Anniversary Inaugural Service we held at Giseikai or this year's Legislative Assembly, we will not be having a separate State-wide service and/or conference due to the fact that we just had the HHMH Joint Conference in 2018, we will be having the BWA World Convention this year in 2019 in San Francisco and coming up in 2023 there will be Shinran Shonin's 850th Birthday Observance and the 800th Anniversary of the Founding of the Denomination to be held in Japan.

An idea for 2019 is to use the Hawaii Kyodan Calendar one Sunday to go over the history of Hawaii Kyodan, but please refer to our Centennial publication, "A Grateful Past, A Promising Future" for more details and other information to honor the past, inspire (us of) the present and hopefully get the interest of future generations. Also, please focus on projects and programs as a way to celebrate our 130th Anniversary. Another project I ask of each temple and sangha including affiliate organizations and internal components is that of inviting or interacting with 1-2 target audiences that you as a temple or organization have never reached out to or interacted with. Please, I beseech you, please share your Joy, Gratitude and Awareness of Amida Buddha's Immense Wisdom and Compassion with others! Let us become, ever more, aware of Amida Buddha's Great Wisdom and Compassion so great that it is known as a non-dichotomous great love or compassion which rejects no one and also become more wisely and acutely aware of our sometimes negative tendencies. Let us not forget and lose sight of the hope and the encouragement we receive from Amida Buddha. Even as bonbu or a spiritually foolish one, illuminated and nurtured by the Buddha's Lights of Wisdom and Compassion, may we embrace (in grateful response) Shinran Shonin's aspiration of "May there be peace in the world, and may the Buddha's Teaching spread!"

The Unfolding Of Life

"There is nothing more real than this truth of life. The fragile nature of human life underlies both the young and old, and therefore we must, one and all, turn to the teachings of the Buddha and awaken to the ultimate source of life".

This passage comes from the letter "White Ashes" written by Rennyo Shonin, the 8th Abbott of our school of Buddhism. I use this letter in one of my memorial services and of course at funerals. As I was writing that talk, I had to look at each paragraph and reflected on what I thought Rennyo might have been trying to say in relationship to the whole letter.

As I looked at this particular paragraph, this was my reflection.

Here Rennyo tells us that given the reality of our situation in this life, we should rely on the teachings of the Buddha and use those teachings as guide to help us through this ever-changing existence. When we use the Buddha's teachings as a guide, we can come to live in a "dynamic harmony" with life, responding to it as it unfolds before us instead of trying to control or force life to do what we want it to.

Now, I know most folks think that "White Ashes" deals with death, but, the more I read this letter, the more I feel it would be more accurate to say that, in part, it deals with the unfolding of life. As Shakyamuni Buddha revealed in his teachings, life is constant is a process of on-going change or impermanence. To deny this or refuse to accept this reality results in the creation of suffering for us.

In this particular paragraph Rennyo says "fragile nature of human life underlying both young and old". This is not something that is open to debate. It would be a waste of time because our life experience reflects the truth of that statement whether we choose to accept it or not. Of course most of us would all like to be able to live forever; however, the causes and conditions surrounding a person's life will not always allow that person to live out what we would consider a full life span of 80 years or so.

The fact of this reality then makes Amida Buddha's compassionate vow all the more important to us who seek to take refuge in it.

This life is full of things to worry about. Often times these worries distract us to the point that we do not live our lives to their fullest extent and precious time is lost. If we can acquire a right view of the true nature of life, including its impermanence, the results can be more freedom to live this life more fully.

Since we are all different, we do this in many different ways. Some people will study and read the teachings of our school. Fortunately we have many fine books written about the True Pure Land School as well as wonderful reflections on the teachings. Some folks will do it by attending services on Sunday and participating in the temple activities. Some people may acquire this right view just by reciting the Nembutsu in gratitude and attending the seminars by visiting lecturers.

Most likely though, it will be any number of differing activities or combinations of these activities as fits the needs of each person that will help to bring them to a better understanding or right view of this life.

Common to all these methods will be the reciting of the Name, Namoamidabutsu. Buddha, to contain the essence of his compassionate 18th Vow, created the Nembutsu for us. It is in this name that we find the wisdom/compassion of Amida, his Vow and the saving activity of Buddha. As we recite the Nembutsu, we express the deepest gratitude we are capable of for everything the Buddha has accomplished on our behalf.

Buddha Day Service (Hanamatsuri)

Sunday April 7, 2019 9:30 AM at Lihue Hongwanji

Hanamatsuri, literally flower festival, is celebrated on April 8, commemorating the birth of Siddhartha Gautama. Siddhartha became enlightened as Sakyamuni Buddha and this marks the release of sentient beings from suffering and sorrow.

According to our tradition, the historical Buddha, Sakyamuni, was born in Nepal on April 8, 566 B.C. He was born the son of King Suddhodana and Queen Maya. There are many flowery descriptions of the scene at his birth, including celestial birds singing beautiful songs, beautiful flowers, and a sweet gentle rain bathing the baby Buddha. It is not necessarily the beauty of the flowers, the sounds of the celestial birds, nor the sweet gentle rain that fell, but the vibrant fact that on this day was born the greatest of sentient beings who became the Enlightened One, the Buddha.

Understanding the Buddha's teaching of interdependency of all things will make it clear that our birth is the result of many causes and conditions. Realizing this we can see that our birth is truly a rare and wonderful gift, and we have an obligation to live out this life in accordance with the teachings of the Buddha.
